Christian Hajjis: Mobility and Status in the Late Ottoman Empire This project explores the formation of Balkan elites in the late Ottoman Empire by focusing on the Christian hajjis—Eastern Orthodox pilgrims to Jerusalem who took as their model the Muslim hajj to Mecca. These pilgrims defy familiar classifications. They adopted the Islamic title "hajji," but in-sisted on their Christian identity.

Reimagining the World After Empire: India and the Cold War, 1950-1970s

Was the post-war twentieth-century global history the epoch of the Cold War? This project challenges that traditional narrative, flipping it to embed the East-West conflict within a longer struggle against empire.

Selby-Bigge (ed.): British Moralists, being Selections from Writers Principally of the Eighteenth Century, Vol. 1

The project consists of the translation into Czech of an anthology of main writings of the authors of Enlightenment moral philosophy including Earl of Shaftesbury (1671–1713), Joseph Butler (1692–1752), Francis Hutcheson (1694–1746) and Jeremy Bentham (1748–1832).
